PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



"And The Survey Says" – Attributes of Thriving Synagogues" Results

Thank you to all who participated in January to complete the "Thriving Congregations Assessment (TCA)," a program

sponsored by USCJ offered to our synagogue at no cost. Seventy (70) members of our Community, which included our Board/Leadership Team (Executive Committee, Committee Chairs and Trustees), prior leadership and others were invited to participate, of which **41 responded**. According to USCJ, this is a great response for a synagogue of our size.

This collaborative exercise will support our shared Vision, help us further plan for our future and build upon our strengths.

The TCA asked us questions based on 7 Foundational Practices of Thriving Congregations (approx. 60 questions in total). The data is robust and provides a snapshot of what features are most important to you and how we are doing on each.

The Thriving Congregations Assessment process will help us:

- -Identify Areas Where We Thrive
- -Explore What is Driving Growth
- -Identify Areas Where We Feel Stuck and Explore Why
- -Consider Unexplored Areas Where We Could Potentially Thrive

Each survey statement offered a rating range of 5 (Strongly Agree) to 1 (Strongly Disagree). Areas of strength scored either 4 or 5 and areas of weakness scored either 1 or 2. With this data and information, we are able to see a comprehensive snapshot of our congregation and learn how people felt about synagogue leadership, sacred purpose, communications, engagement and other key areas. In short, it is this data that will help us set priorities for improvement and obtain the future to which we aspire.

We will be reviewing the results within the Seven Foundational Practices of Thriving Congregations.

Let's start with the first Foundational Practice - Develop a Shared Compelling Vision of Jewish Community, and their associated survey questions. Keep in mind this is the first of 7 Foundational Practices. More will be covered in future *Hakol* articles and at Board meetings and the June Annual Meeting

Where we scored 80% or higher (Strongly Agree - 5 or Moderately Agree - 4) – we celebrate Strengths to build upon; where we scored 20% or lower (Somewhat Disagree - 2, Strongly Disagree - 1), we have more work to be done

Q1. Our congregation has gone through a visioning process in the last five years.

Score 3.93 - 78.5%

Q2. I can articulate the values of our congregation and what makes it unique.

Score 4.2 - 84%

Q3. The lay and professional leadership seem to make decisions with the congregation's mission, vision, and values in mind.

Score 4.1 – 82%

Q4. Our programs are aligned with our mission and vision.

Score 4.07 - 81%

Q5. The clergy and professional staff have taken the time to build trust, and they have the support of the congregation.

Score 4.07 - 81%

Q6. We use a variety of communication strategies to tell compelling stories of how the congregation impacts people's Congregation impacts people's lives.

Score 3.41 - 68%

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Q7. The congregation has a visible and effective social media presence.

Score 3.24 - 65%

Q8. We do a good job keeping congregants informed about programs and events.

Score 4.4 - 87%

Q9. People are easily able to navigate our website.

Score 3.5 - 71.2%

In future *Hakol* issues, we will delve deeper into each of these areas, sharing with you our successes, areas where more action is needed and set our future priorities.

MEET OUR MEMBERS

Meet Ellie Cantor

For the past several months, Team Engage has been bringing you short articles about various people at CBJ – leaders, long-time members, new members, etc. This month I thought it might be good to share a bit about myself since a lot of you may now know me.

I was raised in a fairly traditional Jewish home, first in West Philadelphia then in the Northeast, where I attended our local "conservadox" (close to orthodox, but with mixed seating) synagogue, Adath Zion, for many years. I went to their religious school through their Hebrew High school, after which I attended Gratz Hebrew High and two additional years at Gratz College. My secular education included the neighborhood Philly schools, then Penn as an undergraduate and University of the Sciences (now part of St. Joe's) and Medical College of PA (now Drexel Med) for grad school, ending up with a PhD in pharmacology (the study of how drugs work and the development of new medications). My father was a pharmacist, and I got my love of science from him.

I moved to northern NJ for a postdoctoral fellowship at the Roche Institute of Molecular Biology where I met another postdoc who is now my husband, Barry Jones. I continued to work in pharma for several years, collecting an MBA in management at Montclair State along the way. When Barry took a position at a pharmaceutical company in Philly's western suburbs, we moved back to the area, settling in our current home in Upper Providence, Montco.

My job hunting process during this move introduced me to the world of executive search, which I found more to my liking than lab work. After a few years working for another firm, and after Barry's employer sold off their local facility leaving him unemployed, we opened CJ Resources as a consulting and search firm working for biopharmaceutical clients. When we reached the age of Medicare eligibility, we closed the company and retired.

I have since filled my time serving on various boards and committees for organizations such as the local chapter of the Association for Women in Science and the Drexel Med Alumni Association, U Sciences and Drexel Boards of Visitors and now CBJ. I also facilitated case-based learning for first and second year medical students at Drexel for a few years. On a personal level, we enjoyed traveling until health issues made that difficult, and we love food and wine experiences and spending time at our house in the Poconos.

I didn't opt to join a synagogue when I first moved back to this area, instead observing holidays and worshiping with family members and friends at their shuls. In 2008, I decided I needed to integrate into the local Jewish community, and CBJ was nearby. I attended Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services as a guest for a few years and liked the experience, the congregants, the leaders, and the "vibe." I became a member in 2020. True to form, I jumped in with both feet, soon accepting the role of co-treasurer for Sisterhood, and corresponding secretary on the CBJ board.

So here I am today building connections, making new friends, and contributing my time, skills, and resources to CBJ!

Adult Education with Rabbi Sultar

"Who can say he knows anything about the Golem? ...Always they treat it as a legend, till somethings happens and turns it into actuality again. After which it's talked of for many a day."

- Gustav Meyrink, in his 1915 novel The Golem

The golem – an artificial person created by mystical and magical means – has taken many different forms throughout Jewish history. In the coming year, we'll explore together the earliest recorded citings/sightings of the golem, and how the legend(s) evolved right up into the 20th century. We'll consider how the golem has served as an ever-changing metaphor for the most pressing issues of each generation. And because the Rabbis of old *believed* the golem existed – whether it actually did or not – they asked halachic/Jewish legal questions that now provide us with a Jewish perspective on today's and tomorrow's headlines, as we stand on the verge of possibly creating the first-ever actual golems in the history of the world.
