## RABBI'S MESSAGE



### Dear *Chaveirim*/Friends:

The first baby I ever saw being born was when I was 25 years old. While on the road, I had made friends who'd become like family, and the mother was pregnant. We kept in close touch as my bicycle journey continued its serendipitous and unpredictable path around the country. It just so happened that I was in southern Mississippi, possibly the closest my journey would take me to where they lived in southern Louisiana, only a few days before she was due. With the help and kindness of two Mississippians who the day before had been strangers, I found myself on a bus headed due south. I arrived in New Iberia, Louisiana with a day to spare before the home birth, and left a few days after, now a godfather.

As I sat on the bus heading due north back to my bicycle in Magnolia, Mississippi, I was exhilarated and exhausted and had plenty of time to ponder over the miracle I'd just witnessed. It was absolutely clear that the baby was unambiguously and undeniably pure and innocent. And then I had the troubling thought that many times we regard the adults we meet with judgment, distrust and fear. I wondered, what was the point, the moment, the age, when the benefit of the doubt shifted from the assumption of innocence to the new default of regarding other people with wariness?

I've been thinking about that experience a lot lately, with the unprecedented death of so many babies in the war between Israel and Hamas. [Please note that I am not attempting to write an up-to-date commentary on the latest developments in the war. As mentioned other times before, the gap between when *HaKol* writings are due and when the newsletter actually arrives in your mailbox is too wide to try to be current. Instead, this is a meditation, taking one step back, about one aspect of the war and its toll.]

Since October 7, Hamas has made it absolutely clear that it doesn't care one whit about Israeli

babies. And it's also made it just as clear that it doesn't care so much about Gazan babies either. It knew full well how Israel would respond to the massacres, and it made the cold-hearted calculation that it was worth the death of Gazan babies and other innocents in the war that would ensue.

We know too that those babies and innocents in Gaza who have been killed by Israeli bombs are also a tragedy. We will argue amongst ourselves whether those deaths were avoidable or not, necessary or not, excessive or not. But none of us can really question whether they were tragic or not. When it comes to babies, can it really matter who the parents are? Is it possible for our hearts not to break?

And I'm brought back to that question that troubled me on that bus ride due north back to Mississippi: at what point does the benefit of the doubt of purity and innocence turn to distrust and fear? At what point do we begin to regard another person as evil, as expendable, as worthy of death?

Much is lost in a time of war. It's our responsibility to make sure that what is *not* lost is our morality and our humanity. It's absolutely not fair that Israel is required to feel more responsibility than Hamas for the well-being of babies in Gaza. But nevertheless, fair or not, we still need to. The moment we start discounting the deaths of babies, we've lost something precious in ourselves as well.

In thinking about Israel's response to the October 7 massacres, it's unacceptable that other countries hold Israel to a higher standard than they themselves are willing to follow. Holding such a double-standard is, to put it bluntly, anti-semitism. We as Jews, however, can and must hold *ourselves* to a higher standard. There is a duty, of course, simply to survive. And there is also a duty to live up to our calling to be "a light unto the nations." To exemplify our highest values not only most of the time, but especially in the most difficult of times.

I wish I had answers. I wish I knew the best way to achieve true security and peace as soon as possible. In my uncertainty, though, I never want to lose sight of the fact that the death of innocent babies is always a tragedy. It is always heartbreaking. And the moment we stop seeing it as such, we will have lost part of our humanity.

I often sign my messages with the Hebrew phrase "For peace." In this difficult time, it is not merely a general wish, but a fervent prayer.

#### I Look Forward to Talking with You!

I look forward to meeting with you to talk about, well, just about anything that might be on your mind.

## A WORD ABOUT YARTZEITS AT CBJ FROM RABBI SULTAR

All members of CBJ have the opportunity to record with the synagogue the dates of *yartzeits* (anniversaries of the death) of people we love and want to remember.

Once CBJ has those dates, a reminder is sent out each year several weeks before the *yartzeit*. The name of the person being remembered is then read out loud on the *Shabbat* of or immediately preceding the *yartzeit*. Many people make an extra effort to attend the Friday evening or Shabbat morning service when the name is read, in order to say the Mourners *Kaddish*. Please know that these names are read out loud and *Kaddish* is said for them whether you're there or not. It is of course better when the person actually saying *Kaddish* is present. (We also read out loud each *Shabbat* the name of members and their family who have died for the entire 30 day (*shloshim*) period following the day of burial).

Some of our members prefer to say *Kaddish* on the actual day of the *yartzeit*. CBJ will always make every effort to make sure that there is a *minyan* at CBJ on the appropriate day so that this can happen (those services are usually scheduled for 7:00 PM). All you need to do is to contact Sandy Stone, whose email address is [sbs1949@verizon.net](mailto:sbs1949@verizon.net), and cell phone is (484) 744-3266. Of course, it always helps to invite friends and family, and to give Sandy a sense of how many more people will be needed to reach the number of 10 Jewish adults.

Saying *Kaddish* is one of three ways that *yartzeits* are observed. Another is to light a 24 hour memorial candle in the evening when the *yartzeit* begins (keep in mind that Jewish days start the evening before the day). And the third is to give *tzedakah* specifically in memory of the person who has died, to continue to bring goodness into the world in their name, when they are no longer directly able to do so themselves. Many people choose to make a donation to their desired fund at CBJ for this purpose. And while we greatly appreciate these donations, the key thing is to give *tzedakah*, whether it's to CBJ or to some other organization close to the heart of the person you're remembering, or meaningful to you.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



### What is CBJ's "Secret Sauce"?

As we turn the page on year 2023 and look ahead together to early 2024, let's answer this question: **"What is CBJ's Secret Sauce Enabling our Community to Thrive?"**

This collaborative exercise will support our shared Vision, help us further plan for our future and build upon our strengths in a strategic way. This assessment process will help us:

- Identify Areas Where We Thrive
- Explore What is Driving Growth
- Identify Areas Requiring Further Attention

Synagogues are complex and, as we know, exceedingly diverse. There is no blueprint or single recipe for success. When a thriving synagogue is at work, there are specific ingredients usually present, leveraging their "Secret Sauce". These elements are referred to as the "Attributes of Thriving Synagogues".

In partnership with USCJ and the support of our USCJ Consultant, we will undertake the Thriving Congregations Assessment (TCA) to assess our overall vitality (takes about 15-20 minutes to complete online). This tool helps us to meaningfully engage in the questions that help define a "successful" synagogue and identify areas where we are thriving and areas where we are not. We will learn about key attributes that contribute to a "successful" congregation (The CBJ Secret Sauce).

More information will be forthcoming in January 2024 including next steps to kick-off the assessment process.

While on the topic of Attributes that contribute to CBJ's success – a CBJ attribute that comes to mind is Community Engagement - our ability to bring our Community together for holiday events and celebrations. We know from experience; our Community is stronger when we come together and even more when we enrich and engage each other....and of course....have a nosh!

Mark your calendar for our Community Menorah Lighting – Sunday December 10 at 4:30pm. This is a special family-friendly community event and an opportunity for all of us to gather with family and friends to celebrate the 4<sup>th</sup> night of Chanukah at CBJ! All are invited to attend, and bring your own menorah - candles will be available. Plus, we will be joined by several dignitaries from our area to celebrate with us.

Our 3rd-5<sup>th</sup> graders have been diving into the Torah portions, the holidays and about the Jewish calendar and why it works as it does.



## CBJ COVID POLICY

### UPDATED

Covid vaccination and up-to-date booster status is strongly encouraged for all who are eligible.

**NOTE:** Covid vaccination is no longer required.

Masking is encouraged, especially for those who are unvaccinated or otherwise high risk. CBJ is a mask friendly community, and everyone who chooses to should feel comfortable masking.

**NOTE:** Masking is not required.

If you have an illness (e.g., fever, cough, flu-like symptoms, sore throat, etc.), then please stay home.

Food and drink are allowed (as per pre-Covid CBJ policy).

Live streaming will continue.

## B'NAI JACOB CEMETERY

The Board of Directors of B'nai Jacob Cemetery Association has approved changes in fees that will take effect on 1 January 2024. The Perpetual Care Fee for CBJ members will be \$1,800, a 20% increase. Similar increases to other fees, which do not apply to CBJ members, will also go into effect. Fees have been held unchanged for the past 2-1/2 years and are now being adjusted to reflect the increase in costs that the Cemetery is experiencing.

All persons wishing to have B'nai Jacob Cemetery be their final resting place must reserve a burial lot in advance of need. CBJ members can reserve a burial lot without advance payment of fees. By pre-paying prior to need, however, CBJ members can ensure that the Cemetery's Perpetual Care Fee is "locked-in" for them or their estate and not subject to the current increase or future increases. Payments can be spaced-out over time to help ease financial burden.

B'nai Jacob Cemetery Association is a non-profit public charity that owns and manages the Cemetery. There are no paid employees. The Cemetery is a traditional Jewish cemetery that adheres to the rulings of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards of the Rabbinical Assembly of Conservative Judaism. Deceased persons of the Jewish faith and those deceased persons who were not Jewish, but were part of a Jewish family, can be buried in the Cemetery.

If you are considering making a reservation for a burial lot, would like to now pre-pay a fee for a reservation that you have already made or just wish to find out more about the Cemetery, please contact Valerie in the CBJ office. You will be put in touch with a representative of the Cemetery who will be able to provide information and assistance.

### Personal Appeal for Help in Israel

Ed Goldman, son of our member Sonja Goldman's son, recently reached out to the CBJ community, for specific help in responding to the destruction of the October 7 massacres by Hamas:

He writes:

You may be aware that three of Sonja's grandchildren live in Israel. Our son Dvir, who is a reservist in Palsar Tsanchanim (special force, Paratroopers) was called into reserve duty within hours of the devastating attack by Hamas the exact Shabbat that it happened.

Just some background – my family are dual citizens and I made Aliyah in my early twenties. I met my wife, Jeanette, at Tel Aviv University, and basically have built a career in various high-tech companies. That opportunity took us to work and live in six countries. Dvir was born in Hong Kong but spent a bit of his childhood in Israel before we relocated to Boulder. He decided to return to Israel for his military service.

Dvir is an amazing young man and is engaged to be married this coming summer to Amit (who is also amazing).

To mainstream into the Army, Dvir joined Garin Tsabar which is an organization that supports lone soldiers from countries like the US to navigate the army enlistment process. Part of this process is absorption into communities as well as enlisting a host family. Dvir was fortunate enough to have the support of Idit and Adiel Porat at Kibbutz Alumim which is in Otef Aza (on the Gaza border).

Kibbutz Alumim is a beautiful place and I have had the fortune to spend Shabbats there as well as Yom Kippur. Dvir's unit is well equipped and he is looking to raise money to rehabilitate the Kibbutz.

Below is his personal outreach:

#### **Alumim coming home with your help**

Dear friends,

Kibbutz Alumim, located on the border of the Gaza Strip was founded in 1966. For the 57 years of its existence, it has flourished, producing prime agriculture, and generations of children and youth.

But all came to a standstill during a long day of battle. On the morning of October 7<sup>th</sup>, on the joyous festival of Simchat Torah, dozens of terrorists infiltrated the kibbutz. They attacked and murdered foreign farm workers, burnt agriculture infrastructure and kibbutz institutions, and then a grand battle ensued, led by the kibbutz security squad, who drove them away. We are raising funds to rebuild and restore Kibbutz Alumim, and we appeal to all of you to assist us as much as you can.

**Alumim has not fallen and never will.** With your help, we can restore Alumim to its magnificent glory and bring her home.

# Does a Golem Count in a Minyan?

## (And Other 21<sup>st</sup> Century Implications of an Ancient Legend)

### Adult Education with Rabbi Sultar

*"Who can say he knows anything about the Golem? ...Always they treat it as a legend, till somethings happens and turns it into actuality again. After which it's talked of for many a day."*

- Gustav Meyrink, in his 1915 novel *The Golem*

The golem – an artificial person created by mystical and magical means – has taken many different forms throughout Jewish history. In the coming year, we'll explore together the earliest recorded citings/sightings of the golem, and how the legend(s) evolved right up into the 20<sup>th</sup> century. We'll consider how the golem has served as an ever-changing metaphor for the most pressing issues of each generation. And because the Rabbis of old *believed* the golem existed – whether it actually did or not – they asked halachic/Jewish legal questions that now provide us with a Jewish perspective on today's and tomorrow's headlines, as we stand on the verge of possibly creating the first-ever actual golems in the history of the world.

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
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
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
